More on the Festival of Flight weekend at Watts Bridge



Dad (Bob) and I arrived on the Friday afternoon and set up camp until Sunday. This weekend is becoming a bit of a ritual for Dad and I and we had a fantastic weekend as usual. There wasn't as many aircraft fly in as there has been in past years, but visitor and car club attendance numbers were probably the best ever.

On the way up I followed Dad's FX in my EJ and we had a great run until he pulled over at the Toogoolawah turnoff to let me know that he had just realised that he'd forgotten to put the esky full

of meat and all the other bags of food in the car. All the food was left at home in the garage.... we'll, once we'd made sure that the grog was safely stashed in the onboard eskies, we continued our journey. A big special thanks goes to Mum (Irene Pritchard) and Cousin Pete (Peter Byrnes from Pine City Towing) for relaying the food supplies to us later that night.

Saturday morning generously allowed us a sleep in as we were enveloped in a 'pea soup' fog until 11am. The fog was probably one of the factors that kept the aircraft attendance low this year as most usually fly in on the Saturday; that and the so called, economic downturn.

Saturday morning; just as we were about to prepare some lunch back at camp; next thing we hear a loud Pssssssshhhhhh noise. "What sort of plane is that!?" someone called. "Shit, the gas hose on the camp cooker has blown", I cried, not knowing whether to run to turn off the gas bottle or run in the opposite direction! After a few seconds the sound started to diminish and I thought, that's lucky, the gas bottle must've been nearly empty. While inspecting the gas hose and not finding anything wrong with it, Dad's mate Don had wandered around the other side of my EJ and discovered my left front tyre flat. The valve stem had blown out.



I've got 7 inch wide mags on it but I only keep a stock standard spare otherwise my esky won't fit in the boot. So I got out the spare wheel, and started to fit it until I suddenly realised it wouldn't spin. The stock HR wheel I had purchased for a spare turns out to be not a HR wheel at all. It wouldn't fit over the HR disc brake callipers. (I'd put a HR front end in my EJ in the early 1990s) Hmmm, lucky the rear drum brakes are still a standard size. We had to remove the back mag wheel, put the spare on there and put the back mag on the front.

I once saw a scissor jack break a pin while changing a tyre. It dropped the car on the ground and luckily didn't hurt anyone. Since then, I've always carried a bottle jack as well as the stock Holden scissor jack in the EJ and this was one occasion I was thankful I had the 2 jacks in the boot.

So that's my personal story. Other NDSCC members who attended that Rob Dix might not have run into were Geoff Norris and Marita Holst. Not to mention the cars, planes and aerobatics, but I guess you'll have to attend next year to experience that for yourself.
